

Advent Reflections

As we enter the season of Advent, Christians face a bit of a culture clash: while we wait for the fulfilment of prophecy, God breaking into the world as one of us, we want to put aside time for prayer, for the Bible, for a period of quiet expectancy for that extraordinary moment to hit us as fact once again. And yet alongside this, our unique and extraordinary faith, is the deafening noise around us: relentless jingling adverts for more food, more bargains, more made-up gaps in our lives that only X can satisfy, the colour, the flashing lights, the muzak, the build-up of tension: 'are you ready?', 'I haven't even started', 'oh I got all mine done at the end of October'. All what? What is everybody doing?

Our churches are doing many things this year to make Christmas, and the divine breakthrough, known more widely. Our focus will be on the transformational miracle of this moment, on deepened connections with each other, with those we invite into God's church, and with those who have never encountered the story quite like this before. It has become so familiar that we must continue to make it fresh and full of wonder and amazement again: God, inconceivable, mysterious creator and perfecter, becoming a tiny vulnerable human baby born into poverty in a country oppressed under a foreign empire, his parents forced to seek refuge abroad... when we are asked 'what is God like?' we have a clear answer: Jesus. And we know what Jesus was like through the four gospels: we have so much source material there to share with others. We will all have our favourite stories of this person that we have been getting to know on our own faith journeys*.

So as we join in with the various activities going on this year we ask God to help us to give people that fresh glimpse of who Jesus is, and what the story we are remembering means to us, while we also look for those quiet spaces of peace to refresh and recharge ourselves on this remarkable journey.

*Some of my favourites: Mary's song of joy and expectation at finding herself pregnant (Luke 1:46-55), the two commandments (Matthew 22: 37-40), 'do not be afraid' (John 6:20), looking after the least (Matthew 25: 35-40 and Luke 10: 25-37). What are yours?

About this time of year, I often visit an elderly lady who lives alone at the top of an almost perpendicular track to take her the Christmas goodies.

Its quite a stressful exercise: with worry as to whether I will catch the train; whether I will make the local connection and finally a twenty mile drive with time to worry as to whether the track will be sufficiently ice free to enable a car to get up it at all.

Shutting the gate on the departing car, the stillness of the night finally takes over: in the distance the bubbling call of a curlew on the riverbank: overhead the silent passage of a barn owl across the moon; the air so bitterly cold and sharp that you can smell the frost on the pine trees, the frosted grass and a brilliant moon combining to create a silver land dreaming under the velvet sky alight with a million stars- the beauty is awe inspiring, the peace tangible after a stressful day.

And it's the same moon and the same stars which shone at Bethlehem when Christ was born. Born into a world of stress to bring peace and hope. His light, like that of the moon, seeking the darkest of places then and seeking them now; light and peace always there ready to support us if we will only shut the gate on our worldly cares, pause for a moment in stillness and let him come in.

In his words "be still and know that I am God."

St Andrew's Methodist Church, Harlow on Sunday 7th December at 3:30pm


Join us for a festive and fun nativity puppet play by Duggie Dug Dug, perfect for the whole family to enjoy together.

Churches respond to asylum reforms

Leaders of the Baptist, Methodist and United Reformed Churches have issued the following statement in response to the government's announcements this week on proposed changes to its asylum and returns policy: Public debate around migration has increasingly been shaped by voices that trade in fear, resentment, and the scapegoating of those who already carry heavy burdens. We fear that the tone and content of the Home Secretary's recent announcement on asylum policy reform risks deepening these fractures rather than healing them. Rebuilding homes and hope: Hurricane Melissa appeal launched for Jamaica

The United Reformed Church, through <u>Commitment for Life</u>, has launched an appeal to support both the immediate and long-term needs of affected church communities across Jamaica following Hurricane Melissa. The most pressing needs include shelter, safe drinking water, sanitation, healthcare, and food. In the coming weeks the focus will shift to the removal of debris and the restoration of basic access. There is also going to

be a need for long-term support around reconstruction of homes, recovery of livelihoods, and the restoration of community services. Your support will be critical for our partner church, the United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands.
